

- Shows pride in what they do and how they do it
- Someone you look up to
- Mentor/role model
- Respects other people, horses, groups
- Good sport; both confident AND knows their limits
- Acts in the best interest of the industry they serve
- Team Player
- Good custodian of the horse
- Ethical
- Constant Learner
- A good example to those coming into the industry

CHA Code of Ethics

- As an individual member or program member of The Certified Horsemanship Association (CHA) in good standing I acknowledge my obligation to uphold the highest standards of horsemanship both at home and when in the public eye. In carrying out the role of providing service to the horse industry, I recognize the need to do so in a professional manner and to deal with the public and our colleagues with the highest degree of integrity.
- I shall conduct myself in a manner consistent with CHA's mission to promote excellence in safety, fun, and education for the benefit of the entire horse industry.
- ▶ I shall uphold CHA's Standards for Equestrian Programs to the best of my knowledge and ability.
- ▶ I shall adhere to the professional standards of CHA and to work to further CHA's goals and objectives.
- ▶ I shall place the most emphasis on the well-being, safety, and enjoyment of my participants and horses.
- I shall maintain a high level of professional competence by adhering to the continuing education requirements as set forth by CHA. In doing so I realize that increased knowledge enhances basic knowledge and provides new knowledge allowing me to share this expanding knowledge with my students and clients.
- I shall acknowledge my membership in this professional community and my responsibility to demonstrate respect for my fellow professionals at all times.
- I shall instill confidence among clients and the public in CHA and in the horse industry avoiding any action conducive to discrediting the horse industry or membership in CHA.

Terminology

- ► Certification of the equine professional in PATH International or Certified Horsemanship Association Instructors of Riders with Disabilities.
- ▶ **Trainer** trains the horse
- ▶ **Instructor** trains the rider on a trained school horse the instructor or program owns or on the owner's horse
- ► Coach trains high level competitive show riders Special Olympics, breed and discipline world shows, etc.

Showmanship is Key

- Showmanship is an event found at many horse shows. It involves a person on the ground leading a horse, wearing a halter or a bridle, through a series of maneuvers called a pattern.

Ground Work

- ▶ Longeing the horse bitted up with Vienna Reins, Side Reins, Elbow Pull, Pessoa system Purpose = top line, abdominal strength, etc.

Bits and Bitting

- ▶ Direct pressure bits reins connect directly to the bit
 - ► Snaffles, Kimberwickes
- ▶ Leverage bits reins connect to a shank and it has to have a curb strap or chain
 - ► Curbs, Kimberwickes, pelhams
- ▶ No bit at all
 - ▶ Bitless bridle, bosal, hackamore

Risk Management

- Recognize legal liability and responsibility of being a part of an equine business
- Recognize potentially unsafe procedures and situations
- Equine Limited Liability Act and Law Suits 48 states (Maryland and California – do not have it)



Equine Law Suits

- ▶ Riding in a Halter
- ► Martingale
- ▶Peacock Stirrup
- ► Mare and Foal



Ways to Decrease Risk

- 1. <u>Design procedures</u> with risk control and containment measures.
- 2. Periodically <u>re-assess risks</u> as a normal feature of business operations and modify.
- 3. <u>Transfer risks</u> to an external agency (e.g. an insurance company).
 - a. Directors and Officers
 - b. General Liability
 - c. Professional Liability
 - d. Personal Excess
 - e. Event insurance for trail rides, clinics, expos
 - f. Mortality insurance
 - g. Care, Custody and Control


Ways to Decrease Risk Con't.

- 4. Avoid risks (e.g. close down a particular high-risk business area).
- 5. <u>Creation of entity</u> for limitation of liability (e.g. create of LLC, S-Corp).
- 6. <u>Have a third party entity</u> involved such as CHA.
- 7. Have <u>equine industry knowledgeable</u> CPA, attorney and insurance agent.

Common Language

- Alphabet soup AHA, CHA, PATH Int'l, AQHA, APHA, etc.
- ► Tack terminology Kimberwicke, surcingle, martingale, horn, cantle, pommel, stirrup hobble, etc.
- Horse terminology ergot, ermine spots, hock, croup, sway backed, ewe necked, sickle hocked, cow hocked, etc.
- Movement of horse terminology forward, collected, extended, impulsion, from behind, lateral, leg yield, half halt, etc.










